Javier "Jake" Margo, Jr., MD, sworn in as TAFP vice president

THE WOODLANDS, TEXAS — Javier "Jake" Margo, Jr., MD, of Rio Grande City, Texas, was sworn in as vice president of the Texas Academy of Family Physicians during the 2015 Annual Session and Primary Care Summit in The Woodlands. Margo assumed his duties Nov. 14 at the TAFP Business and Awards Lunch.

Margo practices family medicine in his hometown of Rio Grande City, Texas. He also serves as president of both the TAFP Valley Chapter and the Hidalgo Starr County Medical Society. He is medical director of the local county hospital where he works in the emergency department. Additionally, Margo practices in the hospital's rural clinic, two local nursing homes, and is the team physician for two high schools in the area.

Margo received his medical degree from Texas A&M College of Medicine and completed a residency with the John Peter Smith Family Practice Residency Program in Fort Worth, Texas.

He is also a member of the Texas Medical Association's Border Health Caucus and Small District Caucus, as well as the Wilderness Medicine Society. As a resident, he served on the American Academy of Family Physicians' Commission on Quality and Scope of Practice and represented Texas as a delegate to AAFP's National Conference of Family Physician Residents.

Family physicians like Margo are qualified to work in all major medical areas and trained to treat more than 90 percent of all cases they encounter. Family physicians care for patients of all ages.

During his year as TAFP vice president, Margo will work with other officers to lead the Academy: President Ajay Gupta, MD, of Austin; President-elect Tricia Elliott, MD, of Galveston; Treasurer Janet Hurley, MD, of Whitehouse; and Parliamentarian Rebecca Hart, MD, of League City.
